Editorial

Ringing histories

Earlier this year we began computerising ringing data species by species from the paper schedules. This gives ringers an overview of the particular species with a standard format of analysis, including: numbers ringed annually, the top five ringers, where the species have been ringed, and mass data. Twenty species have been summarised on our web pages at: http://www.uct.ac.za/depts/stats/ adu/safring/results/results-index.htm, and many species are in the process of being added. If you would like to computerise your favourite species, let me know. One of the best things a ringer can do, however, is to first computerise all his/her ringing data and submit that to SAFRING.

Ringing data and new ringers

Most ringers are now submitting their annual ringing data electronically and this is very encouraging. It means that more analyses can be done and it is possible to do more queries. It is imperative, however, that data be entered accurately. Training of new ringers has included very little or no training on data entry. From now on, when a trainee has completed the field training and the training ringer recommends that the trainee qualifies as a ringer, there will be an additional step. The trainee will be sent copies of schedule data which need to computerised and sent to SAFRING. The data entry accuracy skill

level needs to be 99% before a traince will be issued with a ringer's number. Special provision will be made for trainees without access to computers, but in the future it will be rare that someone who can afford to buy ringing equipment will not have access to a computer (or at least, to a computer belonging to a friend).

Travel

In August I attended the 23rd International Ornithological Congress in Beijing, China. Eating Chinese for 2 weeks was fun! There was a Round Table Discussion on ringing and it was great to meet old, and make new, contacts with ringing organisers. In September Doug Harebottle and I travelled to bird clubs in the Free State, Gauteng, Limpopo Province, Northwest Province, Northern and Western Cape. In the evenings we gave feedback on the ADU projects and on ringing. In the mornings we gave ringing demonstrations. We ringed about 500 birds, including many species we had not handled previously.
