REQUEST FOR INFORMATION : COLOUR-RINGED SWIFT TERNS

Swift Tern Sterna bergii chicks have been ringed on islands in the southwestern Cape since 1977. After breeding, adults along with young birds spread out along the coastline as far east as Natal. Red colour rings were used in 1979 and yellow ones in 1980. This year blue has been used when members of the African Seabird Group ringed 193 blue left metal right at Vondeling Island and 222 blue over metal left at Robben Island. Sightings of these colour ringed birds along with flock size and numbers of juveniles

(heavily barred individuals) present are requested. The date and locality are also needed.
