SAFRING has no record for the use of this ring. It was one of a series issued by the S.A.O.S. to ringers in the early 1960s. These rings were customarily issued in batches of four or five, rather than fifty, and many different people used rings from this series. There is scheduled primary data from some of them but not for rings 5082676-2681. Some ringers who live or have lived in Zimbabwe have been contacted but none of them have used this ring.

More recently, in April 1987, John Bunning caught a Fiscal Flycatcher at Melville Koppies bearing ring number BB-02026. Here again, SAFRING has no schedule for the series. The rings were originally issued to the late Royce Reed. If Royce ringed this bird, then it is a very old Fiscal Flycatcher! It seems more likely that the rings were used by somebody else.
