# REPORT ON THE 1995-1996 RINGING YEAR

For a variety of reasons, this issue of *Safring News* is a few months late, and by the time most ringers receive it, the current (1996-1997) ringing year will be three-quarters gone. So bear in mind that *this* report is for the 12-month period that started almost two years ago in July 1995.

### Ringing effort

For those who live on the highveld in the summer rainfall region, it was a year of both dust storms and rain storms, conditions which made mistnetting impossible on many occasions. Nevertheless, over 65 000 birds were ringed, 6 000 less than the previous record year. This drop was due largely to the virtual

suspension of African Penguin banding for the duration of the review period, whereas over 5 600 African penguins were banded in the 1994-1995 year (many of those as a result of the Apollo Sea disaster). The overall high level of ringing effort has thus been maintained. Table 1 provides the regional totals, and North West Province (effectively reflecting the efforts of the Wesvaal Voelklub) finally and deservedly tops the list. The Western Cape achieves second place primarily because of its high complement of ringers, with Gauteng close on its heels. Ringers in these three provinces collectively contributed 61% of the annual total of birds ringed. KwaZulu-Natal heads up the rest of the regions; Swaziland. in deference to the single ringer resident there, has this year been included with Mpumalanga. For those readers who note the discrepancy between the total given for Zambia in Table 1 and the total given in the Report on bird ring-

ing in Zambia on page 72. It must be noted that SAFRING rings have so far only been used on the smaller birds.

Many of the active ringers are taking their nets with them on holiday and ringing in regions other than those in which they live. The totals in Table 1, however, are based on the totals of ringers domiciled within the region, irrespective of where they ringed their birds. There are still schedules outstanding, but it is unlikely that further submissions will change the rankings in any of the tables in this report.

Table 2 lists the Top 20 ringers for the 1995-1996 year and shows why North West Province leads the regional rankings. It is quite possible (judging from schedules already received for the the current year) that the Top 20 for the 1996-1997 ringing year will all have four-figure totals. To achieve such a total calls for a substantial outlay in time and money and

SAFRING is currently fortunate to have increasing numbers of ringers who can make such commitments. High ringing totals ultimately contribute to increased recovery rates and comprehensive retrap data. The majority of ringers, however, have neither the spare time nor the finances to attain high ringing totals. That does not mean that their ringing efforts are any the less valuable to SAFRING. After all, even one bird ringed has as good a chance of recovery as 999 others of the same species ringed at the same place on the same day. It is important to bear in mind that every ringer makes a contribution, whether he or she rings ten birds or a thousand birds, and it is not necessary for anybody to hang up their ringing pliers because they have the feeling that they cannot compete with those who make it into the Top 20. Nobody has to compete, but everybody can contribute to the investment in ringed, free-ranging wild birds and feel a sense of achievement thereby.

Table 3 lists the birds which have received the most attention from ringers in the terrestrial and marine environments, respectively. Most of the seabirds have been ringed by professional research and conservation teams on offshore or oceanic islands, spearheaded by the Sea Fisheries Research Institute of the Department of Environmental Affairs and Tourism. It would be worthwhile if some of the provincial Nature Conservation authorities became involved again with the ringing of waterfowl in freshwater environments; it is an aspect of research which has languished now for almost a decade.

On the terrestrial scene, a notable movement involves the Redbilled Quelea, the notorious pest bird, from sixth spot last year to second place this year. This is largely due to sponsorship by the Department of Agriculture of rings used on this species, together with cooperation between ringers of the Wesvaal branch of Birdlife South Africa and the Quelea Control Centre. European Swallow ringing has stayed at the same level as the previous year, much down from the totals of former years, mainly because too little water or too much of it made trapping at swallow roosts difficult. However, John and Dave Dalziel did well with their

Yellow Wagtail roost this year (Yellow Wagtail roost sites are more difficult to pinpoint than Euro Swallow roosts) and caught enough to get this attractive palearctic migrant well into the Top 20 list – its first such listing in southern Africa. It was evidently a bad year for waders or for wader ringers; the Curlew Sandpiper, which usually figures in the Top 20, was way below the cutoff point this year.

It is interesting to look at the Top 20 list in terms of dietary preferences of the birds and to note that more than half are seedeaters. Is this because they occur in greater numbers, or because their eyesight is not as acute as insectivorous birds and they do not see the nets so easily?

The Top 10 raptors, caught as free-flying birds (rather than as nestlings or rehabilitees) are listed in Table 4, together with the most successful of the Balchatri ringers. Compilation of this Table is rather difficult as we have only the shedule totals from which to extract the data and we cannot tell from these the circumstances attendent upon the catching of these birds. Nevertheless, some recognition is due to the efforts of raptor ringers, who will

doubtless claim that quality is always better than quantity, even though, in the excitement of the catch, they have been known to ring an already-ringed bird (see *Safring News* 25(1) page 46).

#### Recoveries

Table 5 ranks the most frequently recovered birds in the 1995-1996 year in descending order. The seabirds top the list, as always. This is to be expected because, in addition to their corpses often being washed up on beaches where people walk, most of them are ringed as flightless juveniles and consistent ringing effort has been maintained for a decade or more on the top four species. The majority of juveniles that do not survive to adulthood come to grief within four months of departure from the breeding colony, and adults may die at any time of the year, so we receive recovery reports throughout the year. By contrast, White Storks, Common, Arctic and Sandwich Terns and European Swallows are reported mainly during the summer months when they are present, all of the Storks and most of the terns and swallows bearing foreign rings. This year there were only 30 foreign ring recoveries out of a total of 546, leaving

the recovery total for local rings at 516, or five better than the previous year.

Ringing schemes that have been issuing hardmetal rings for a few decades tend to reap rewards in terms of the increasing numbers of long-lived birds that are recovered with each year that passes.

The Selected Recoveries Report in this issue, covering the second half of the 1995-1996 ringing year, is no exception. It features the oldest African Penguin to date, the oldest Pale Chanting Goshawk and the oldest Kelp Gull, and it illustrates what is probably the basic romance of ringing birds – the possibility that the bird to which one is fitting a ring will be

recovered in some far distant land, or, if not a migrant, at some far distant time.

Did Clive Elliott have any inkling that the penguin he was fitting with band P 4234 would be recovered 23 years hence? Can Harry Biggs remember ringing the only PCG he caught at Smouspoort in the De Aar district on a winter's day in 1975? Did Peter Ginn ever expect that two of the 39 Kelp Gull chicks that he ringed on 22nd November 1971 in the Keurbooms River colony would live there for the next 22 to 24 years? As mentioned earlier in this report, no matter how many or how few birds you catch, each individual bird you ring has the potential to reveal something remarkable. That is what makes it all so worthwhile.

### SASOL REPORT ON SELECTED RE-COVERIES RECEIVED AT SAFRING: JANUARY 1996 - JUNE 1996.

#### Terry Oatley

Records for a total of 87 recoveries (including 10 controls) of 48 species have been selected for this list. Most of the records were reported during the period January to June 1996 and include 16 records involving foreign-ringed birds of nine species (compared to 21 foreign ring recoveries for the same period in the preceeding year).

As in previous reports, criteria for selection involve significant movement (especially that indicating post-natal dispersal or that of normally sedentary species), interesting elapsed time between ringing and recovery (reflecting number of years survived), and instances of known cause of death. The list thus includes 38% of all the birds recovered during this half year period.

This half-yearly report is published with the generous support of SASOL whose sponsorship of bird awareness programmes has significantly boosted ring recovery reporting rates.
